

From the Minister ..



A brand-new year is upon us, this is the first edition of the Messenger to come out in 2023 and what a year we have ahead of us...

It's fair to say that for us as a church, 2022 was difficult. We lost some very dear brothers and sisters, and we continue to uphold their families in our prayers as significant anniversaries come about. 2023, so far, has had much more of a positive start and we were delighted recently to ordain Isaac Oru as an Elder and to welcome back, Jo Oru, Peter Jolly and Anne Glenn into roles on the church leadership team. We have also been encouraged by the response to our Hope Explored course and we have had some really good conversation with both Christians and those searching.

Any year comes with both challenges and opportunities. This is the year in which we are due to start significant works on our church sanctuary. These works are scheduled to begin just after Easter and already have thrown things at us which we were not quite expecting (thank you asbestos...) I am confident that there will be more unexpected joys (challenges) to come our way but that with the refurbishment team keeping a close eye on things, that these will be overcome and that towards the end of this year, we will celebrate the joyous re-opening of our beautiful sanctuary and seize the opportunities that this presents us with. We also obviously have less ability to run separate groups such as our JFC during this time and we need to think carefully as a church family about how and why we do things during this time so that all can be included in worship. We will be using the church meeting in March to consider some of these questions so please do get your thinking caps on.

We have a real opportunity this year to take the good news out into our community and to offer them the invitation to come and see once the works to our building are complete. There are going to be significant challenges ahead and we thank Tim Abbott, Wendy Cassar and Brian King for all they are doing in leading us through these challenges, but with any challenge comes an opportunity to consider how and why we are doing something and to possibly try new things as well! Keep praying brothers and sisters and lets embrace what this year brings as a family of faith.

Hello everyone,

When you read this, I will have been Church Secretary for 10 years! Little did I think that I would still be in post all this time later. And what an honour and a privilege it has been. (It's ok this is not a resignation message even though I say "Sack the sec" quite frequently!)

The last month has been an emotional time for me as my darling Mum died on January 4th. For those who have been privy to the ups and downs with my Mum will know that she really has been the bounce back kid over the last 4 or 5 years. There have been many times when I have said goodbye thinking it would be the last time I would see her only to find her hale and hearty the next day! This time was different, and I want to share a couple of things that happened very recently. Mum had the most vivid dreams about my Dad, who died 12 years ago. She was convinced that he had visited her in person and had come to take her out. I had to remind her that he had died a long time ago. Just a week or so before she died, she told me that she had been at one of the events in the care home and a man who looked just like Dad was sitting next to her. It has really made me wonder about what was going on. I have been so lucky to have my Mum for 71 years – she was 98 last September- and to have been able to share so much with her.

One last thing I want to share is that on my way to church on the Sunday after Mum died, I was feeling a bit fragile and knowing how emotional I get I was praying that I could be strong and not get too upset. It was a miserable, rainy morning but suddenly the clouds parted, and the sun shone straight into the car and into my eyes! It was the only sun I saw that day. If that wasn't an answer to prayer, then I don't know what is! (and I didn't cry at church!)

Thank you, as always, to my lovely church family. You are all very special to me.

Newsletter from Rangiora Alan

Dear family and friends.

This year has been one of moving into more leisure as I finished my halftime position with the Hurunui churches in mid-January but have still carried on as Interim Moderator and as a member of the Ministry Settlement Board. Both those roles carry on into next year.

In July I was approached by Alan Judge, Executive Officer for the Southern Presbytery, to see whether I might lead a team to do a review of the Presbytery. I agreed and am in the thick of that at present. The review is scheduled to be finished before May next year. It mainly involves emails and phone calls, and the occasional Zoom meeting. Although I might have wished to travel to Dunedin for some in-person meetings, that has been put on hold as you will realise from Sue's news.

After my heart surgery last year, I have kept good health, apart from catching Covid at the end of our visit to the UK in October. I do find I sleep much longer than before and get tired more easily when working outside, but that may be simply age!

We enjoyed our visits down to our caravan at Bannockburn Domain Motor Camp, and other holidays that Sue will describe. The biggie was a trip back to the UK from 3rd October to 4th November. After staying for a couple of days with Sue's cousin, Diane, near Preston, we had stays in Southport, Lothersdale (Yorkshire Dales), Chesterfield, Macclesfield, Ulverston, Stockton-on-Tees, and then back to Diane's. At the beginning of our time in the UK we enjoyed catching up with old friends in Southport, and also taking a Sunday service at Ainsdale.

Diane flew back to NZ with us and when we arrived back, we all tested positive for Covid. Sue and I were immediately supplied antivirals. While Diane and I recovered quickly, Sue did not feel well and as a result her trips around the country with Diane were cancelled.

Sue will describe her own health issues, but since mid-November I have been keeping close to home and supporting her to the best of my ability. We are looking forward to Melvin and boys and our friends Alan and Gloria Russell joining us for Christmas, after I take the service (with Sue playing) at St Albans Union Church.

Apart from continued involvement with Rangiora Rotary and Budgeting Services North Canterbury, I spend a lot of time walking our dog Pepper with Sue (that seems to have settled my knee down, especially after a cortisone injection in January), going to movies at our very good local cinema, reading, gardening,

watching TV programmes (especially the police and hospital/ambulance ones!), and doing the newspaper Sudoku, Code-Cracker, and cryptic crosswords.

2022. We received this year's news from a family member headed 'The year of Ups and Downs'. A very apt title as mine has been a little like that with the added sense of being in a game of ten pin bowls and all my bowls have been knocked down and I'm out. Some years are like that. It can be a real challenge to find the solid base of one's faith, hope, and a sense of any future or even purpose. So as not to be so cryptic I will make mention now and get on with the blessings. It was meant to be brief. Perhaps I should have done a timeline!

Physically very unwell for most of this year. Even closing my business a little earlier than I intended didn't help. Cataract surgery in both eyes in July and great difficulty with my vision since then. The only positive thing I can say about that is that I don't have cataracts anymore and I wait to see the surgeon who is so busy with new patients that he can't see a previous one to check all is well. I am in the process of getting some spectacles that hopefully I can see out of.

In September I needed a tooth removed as there was an infection in the root canal... well if you haven't had dry socket, I wouldn't wish it on anyone. I could have chopped my head off. The pain was more than intense.

The holiday in the UK was not enjoyable and I still say to Alan that I am looking for the diamonds amongst the ashes. I was quite unwell the whole time. We both came back with Covid. He bounced back. I didn't. However, the biggie is that my bone marrow is no longer working as it should. Hasn't been for years and I have been on chemo but stable. No diagnosis so far but I am back with my haemotologist oncologist who is doing his best and I am being fast tracked (hopefully) for a bone marrow biopsy before New Year. Serious anaemia, night sweats, etc, etc. Lost all energy by about midday. So lots of fun. Alan is being great and has continued honing his cooking skills. Unfortunately, I have lost most of my sense of taste.

We are thrilled to have a large garden and he is enjoying getting out in that, although not on hot days (for us) like today. It was a blessing we didn't move to our intended retirement home – lock up and leave. Would have been more like locked in (with lockdown) and don't leave and I couldn't have looked out to the flowers and blossom. Three trips away, apart from to the caravan in Bannockburn. Picton – enjoyable when one is well and can sleep through the night sounds of the ferry terminal. Great hotel though. Hokitika – brilliant hotel with great views and great restaurant. Again, too unwell to really enjoy it. Then Hanmer Springs hotel for a few nights. Very enjoyable and made the forest walk and a trip to the pools. Unfortunately, we won't be able to go to our caravan in Bannockburn until I am less unwell.

Our garden is magnificent. Lots of blossom, roses, etc and is a joy to look out of the windows. This is a new area of garden where I decided to throw a packet of wildflowers at the beginning of the year before planting shrubs etc. They were beautiful. It is now planted out with roses, rhododendrons, purple flag iris, and lilies.

What the temptations mean for us

Immediately after His baptism in the River Jordan, Jesus faced and resisted three powerful temptations during 40 days in the wilderness of Judea. This time of testing and temptation was His preparation for the

work God had sent Him to do on earth. It's the principle behind the season of Lent, which begins on 22nd February. Although the temptations were personal to Jesus, many of us will recognise their relevance in our own lives.

The first was simple. 'You're hungry. You can do miracles. Well, turn these hot stones at Your feet into loaves of bread'. It sounds quite plausible, but in fact it's an invitation to put one's own needs first. Temptation rejected.

Then came the second: 'throw yourself off a pinnacle of the Temple. You know that God will send His angels to catch you before you hit the ground'. Again, it's plausible (there was even a verse from the Bible to back it up). But this would be to substitute one spectacular publicity stunt for the hard slog of travel, preaching, healing and touching individual lives. Temptation rejected.

The third was outrageous. 'Fall down and worship corrupt and evil power, and You will have infinite worldly power and success'. In other words, the divine Son of God should deny His Father and worship the devil, to glean success without going to the Cross. For the third time, temptation resisted.

I know these temptations were tests of the Messiah Jesus, but can't we see in them temptations that come to all of us from time to time? Look after number one, and all will be well. Take the short cut to success and avoid all the hard slog. Compromise your integrity, in order to fulfill your ambitions. Or choose the hard way: walk the narrow path of honesty, commitment, and truth. That's really the Lenten choice.

UKRAINE MISSION UPDATE

Thank you so much for your ongoing kindness to Ukraine Christian Partnership. We are so grateful for all your donations and prayers. Please continue to pray for peace and the relief of suffering in Ukraine.

We would like to give a special thanks to Connie's handicraft group, both those who create the lovely goods for sale and those who purchase them. Further kind donations meant a tremendous total of £1215 was raised during 2022.

We have seen in the news the terrible damage being done by the Russians to the Ukrainian infrastructure. Daily long power cuts are being felt across the whole country, not just war-torn areas. Thanks to a very generous donor we have been able to provide generators for the Akli, Aklihegy and Gyula churches as well as two generators for the church and communities we have been supporting in Kherson.

November was relatively peaceful, Russian withdrawal from Kherson city was a blessing, despite Russian destruction of critical infrastructure and looting. However, life continues to be tough and dangerous, just in different ways to the occupation period. There is little or no electricity, limited water & gas supplies, and Russian artillery and missiles strike from the opposite side of the Dnipro River (where a few of our beneficiaries live). Below are just a few stories about the families your kind donations are helping:

Svetlana is a mum with a 12-year-old son with special needs. He requires constant care, nappies & medication. She has no family other than an elderly stepfather to help her. Receiving her monthly little videos is so moving. Quotes from her recent reports:

"The city is under severe fire. Yesterday there was a hit right next to us, our neighbour got killed. Today they're shooting again."

"No light and water in the city for 11 days already. I found a shop with internet connectivity; they helped me to cash the money you sent. Thank you so much!"

"Today we got a tiny flow of water in the house – so I washed our clothes by hand. I'm trying to buy food that won't go off without a fridge. God bless you."

Yana lives in a village still under Russian occupation. She has four young children and also looks after her sick father and two grandmothers. She sold everything she could, from TV set and computer to even her potted plants and underwear, in order to buy food. In November, her sick father was thrown into prison by the Russians. We are sending her money to buy food for her children. She is also helping us by taking food & hygiene products to the local hospital for 2 of our other beneficiaries.

Luba and her husband, in their 50s, had to flee their war-torn village. They are receiving from us £15 every 10 days to help them buy food and medicines. Words from Luba:

"War is a terrible thing. Now for 8 months we've been moving from place to place, never a corner of our own. It's scary and hurtful. We went to see our village in October – but we can't live there: it's still being bombed. No water, gas or electricity. Very cold and dangerous. Soldiers lived in our house and took everything: boiler, washing machine, fridges, even our gas oven and sofas. Took our car. Painted our windows black. Devastation. We just mended the roof – and it got hit again. Kitchen got a direct hit. But guess what: my flowers have survived!!"

While the horror of this war can make us despair, your prayers and donations are continuing to help many, many individuals at this very difficult time. Thank you so much.

The key to a happy life

Your mental health is the biggest single predictor of your personal happiness. So, suffering from depression or anxiety disorders can devastate your life.

Finding love is also a vital ingredient for happiness. "People need to be needed, and to be in meaningful relationships", says a recent study by the London School of Economics. It goes on: "Happiness is hugely affected by the ethos of a society, which affects everyone in it. For example, happiness is higher in societies where people trust each other. Freedom is also a crucial determinant of happiness."

The report also found that a boost in income, or more education, did not significantly affect our overall well-being. Having good mental health and someone to love were far more important.

The Language of Love

Valentine's Day reminds us of the importance of expressing our love to those close to us. But how can we go beyond simply offering flowers and a card?



Jesus says: 'A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another' (John 13:34). How can we express love like Jesus in our everyday relationships to our partner, children, neighbours, or work colleagues?

Listening

We need to listen to others, just as Jesus did. He asked questions of people and waited for them to process their answer. According to James, *'everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry'* (James 1:19). How well do we listen to others? How often do we find ourselves already thinking of what we want to say before somebody's finished speaking? Listening takes time; don't rush it!

Touching

Jesus reached out to touch the untouchables in His world, including lepers, the sick and children. This was completely out of character for rabbis of His day. For us today, a warm handshake may be of value. Of course, it should always be an *appropriate* touch – helpful for the other person, not just for ourselves.

Speaking

Jesus' conversation was always full of grace and truth (John 1:14). Do we speak words of *grace*, by offering comfort, giving encouragement, or expressing care and concern? However, we should also be ready to speak words of *truth*, in asking for forgiveness, seeking reconciliation, or addressing conflict. As Paul urges us, don't avoid: *'speaking the truth in love'*.

Where is the challenge for us in expressing love this Valentine's Day?

Eco corner - information and updates from the Eco Group

We offer a few tips on possibilities for more than kerbside recycling, for refilling and reusing in Petersfield....to be good stewards of God's beautiful creation!

Medicine blister packs accepted at Love Lane community centre for recycling, office open weekdays 0900 -12.30hrs, **OR** can be left in the same recycling crate in church vestibule adjacent to Petersfield Infant School items.

Plastic bag recycling available at some supermarkets including Waitrose and Tesco's Petersfield.

Soft plastic packaging can be returned to the Causeway Tesco store, the majority of which can then be recycled (80% in a trial), e.g. fruit and veg packaging, salad bags, crisp packets.

Tetrapak Cartons and paper containers (such as Pringles tubes etc.) can be recycled at the bank site at Tesco Petersfield, The Causeway, GU31 4JR

See the adjacent **Petersfield infant school recycling poster**, but if it is more convenient to you, there is a crate in the church vestibule for these items which David Barton then kindly takes to the school.

<u>Liss junior school</u>, if you live in Liss or are passing you might like to know that 9am -3pm during term time, Monday to Friday, reception will accept the items below. You can also now leave these items in the bag for <u>Liss junior school</u> in the church vestibule, to be kindly taken to the school by Tony Phillips who lives near the school.

Liss JS:- Digestive and other biscuit wrappers; cracker and cake wrappers; crisp packets; oral care products – toothpaste tubes and toothbrushes; Pringle tubes, **all clean and tied in a bag**.

Supermarkets, free of single use plastic.

Refill and Replenish, 15 the High Street, Petersfield, Tuesdays to Saturdays 9am – 5 pm

Juniper, 16 Lavant Street, Petersfield, Mondays to Saturdays, 9am - 5pm Sell food stuffs, handwash, floor cleaner, other cleaning products and other items.

- 1. Bring your clean containers (Tupperware, bags, jars etc)
- 2. Weigh your containers.
- 3. Fill your containers.
- 4. Reweigh your containers.
- 5. Pay.


Fairtrade Fortnight 2023

You can help three ways during this Fortnight.







Whilst there is a degree of excitement at taking on a new challenge, I will be very sad to leave Wessex behind. The churches, the people, the staff team and the beautiful area have meant that this has been a good place to be. It has been a privilege to spend twelve years of my ministry here.
