#### From the Minister ..

It's been a busy start to 2025! My time at London Street, Basingstoke came to an end in December and some of my new responsibilities, filling the additional 25% of my scoping are starting to take shape.



I will be taking on the role of Candidating and Ordinand Secretary from Rev'd Mary Thomas when she retires in 2026 and have started to shadow her in this role. This has involved trips to Dorset and Oxford in recent weeks to talk with people taking God's call on their lives seriously. My role is to talk them through the process of applying to train for ministry all the way through until they start their training and during that period they will spend at college as well. It's a real blessing and joy to walk this journey with people and I'm looking forward to doing so.

I also headed out to Guernsey at the start of March. Synod has recognised that for a very long time the churches on the Channel Islands have had little, regular support from an ordained minister. My role will be to visit on four weekends this year (May, July and November) to offer support in any way I can and lead worship on a Sunday morning over there. It is a very different worship leading experience, but one that I enjoyed very much.

Closer to home we have been journeying though Lent together and I have been really pleased with the way our Lent course has been going. The course itself has been really engaging and challenged all of us participating to spend time reflecting on many different aspects of God's wonderful creation and the situations we find ourselves in each and every day.

As Holy Week and Easter draws ever closer it feels appropriate to let you know where and how we can worship together. On Maundy Thursday we will be hosted by Petersfield Methodist Church and will share a simple supper together at 6pm in their hall, this feels hugely symbolic as we gather around tables to remember that supper shared by friends on the night Jesus was betrayed. When supper is over, there will be the chance to head into their church sanctuary together for some reflections of Gethsemane. I do hope that many of you will be able to join us for this reflective, meaningful time of worshipping together.

On Good Friday, once again, we will be joining in with the PACT organised walk of witness and service in the square. The walk begins from Petersfield Methodist church at 9.30am and the service will commence at 10am. There will be refreshments including hot cross buns in St Peter's after the service. It's always wonderful to worship together with other Christians in the town and this year our very own Carolyn oversees proceedings as PACT Chair for the year, please do come along and support her as we reflect together on the tremendous sacrifice our Saviour made for us on the cross. On Easter Sunday, we will gather at College Street at 10.30am to celebrate the miracle of the resurrection! The service will include Holy Communion and there may even be an Easter egg hunt for the children when they go out to Children's Church!

Easter is the most important moment in the church calendar. Without it, our faith would be meaningless. The song 'Cornerstone' sums it up wonderfully as it says, 'My hope is built on nothing less than Jesus' blood and righteousness. I dare not trust the sweetest frame but wholly lean on Jesus' name.' So, this Easter, why not invite family and friends to come along to one of our services? You never know, they might hear what we are all about and want to take up the offer of a transformed, new life with Christ as their cornerstone.

#### A Message for Lent 2025

Dear friends,

As we enter this Lenten season, we find ourselves in a world filled with challenges. The ongoing humanitarian crises in Gaza and Ukraine, the increasingly visible effects of climate change, and the divisive political rhetoric that surrounds us can leave us feeling overwhelmed and powerless. Yet it is precisely in such times that the meaning of Lent becomes most powerful. When Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness, he faced not just external temptations but profound questions about his identity and purpose. His forty days of struggle weren't about proving his willpower - they were about clarifying who he was called to be in a broken world.

Perhaps our greatest temptation today is not chocolate, social media, or other small indulgences we might give up for Lent. Perhaps our greatest temptation is to turn away from the difficult truths about ourselves and our world, to sleepwalk through life rather than to engage with it fully and courageously.

When we look away from the suffering in Gaza or Ukraine, when we ignore the realities of climate change, when we dismiss those whose politics differ from ours, we're not just avoiding uncomfortable topics, we're avoiding the deeper work God calls us to do: the work of becoming more fully ourselves and more fully present in God's world.

Fortunately, there is good news: the same Spirit that Luke tells us led Jesus into the wilderness remains with us today. The same Spirit that the writer of Genesis tells us hovered over the waters of creation continues to move through the chaos of our lives and our world, bringing forth new possibilities, new understanding, and new life.

This Lent is a good time to ask ourselves what are we running from today? What truth are we afraid to face? Where might the Spirit be leading us to grow? As you reflect, remember that we don't face our wilderness alone. We journey together as Christ's body, supporting one another with compassion and hope; and we journey with the Spirit, who knows that our struggles are not about proving ourselves good or bad, but about discovering who we are truly called to be.

May this Lenten season be for each of us a time of honest reflection and renewed commitment. May we find the courage to face difficult truths about ourselves and our world. And may we emerge from these forty days more fully alive, more deeply connected, and more ready to be bearers of God's love and justice in a world that so desperately needs them.

## 20th April - Why Easter will never go away

How do you make sense of the Resurrection? Dead men don't rise, so why believe that this particular dead man did rise?

At the end of St Luke's gospel, we read that: "they still did not believe it because of joy and amazement" (Luke 24:4). This is highly significant. The Gospels do not show us a group of disciples who were in a receptive frame of mind. After the crucifixion, they were in hiding, frightened and scattered. Then suddenly, they came out of hiding and were totally different; excited, joyful. By Pentecost they were confident, with one firm message: 'You crucified Jesus, but God raised Him up!'

How did they know this? Because of direct personal experience. Some of them had visited the tomb of Jesus: it was empty. Others claimed to have seen and touched the risen Lord. Were they hallucinating? People can hallucinate in groups — when taking drugs, for example. But of course, each one will see a different hallucination. But the disciples all saw the same thing. Or rather, the same person. Jesus.

Were they lying? Jesus had died a humiliating death as a criminal. Perhaps they wanted to rescue His good name. So, did they pretend they had seen Him?

This theory has a big problem. Their preaching led them into trouble with the authorities. They were beaten and imprisoned and some of them killed. People will die for ideas and causes which they believe in passionately. But not for things they have made up. We might suffer for our convictions, but we will not suffer for our inventions.

What about the 'swoon' theory? That Jesus didn't die on the cross, despite terrible wounds? That He recovered in the tomb, and then escaped? That the disciples nursed Him back to health? But Roman soldiers knew when a man was dead; and there was the guard on the tomb. Also, the events which followed simply don't fit. If the disciples had been hiding Jesus all along, they would have kept very low-key, and out of the way, so that the authorities did not come after Him again.

Besides, to preach that God had raised Jesus from the dead – which is exactly what they did preach – would have been a lie.

Beatings and threat of death would soon have loosened their tongues. Inventions crumble under pressure; convictions hold fast.

Another reason for believing in the Resurrection is this: Jesus' continuing impact. Thousands and soon millions of people in every generation since have shared an inescapable sense of being 'accompanied' through life. Though unseen, they identify this presence as the Risen Lord.

Sometimes this experience of meeting Jesus is gentle and fitful. Sometimes it is dramatic and life changing. This reminds us that the resurrection of Jesus is not just an interesting historical puzzle. It is a vital, present-day reality. It brings wonderful comfort, assuring us of the central Christian truths: death is dead; Jesus is alive; God is love.

This central notion was captured, most movingly, by the great Albert Schweitzer: 'He came to those men who knew Him not. He speaks to us the same word: "Follow thou me," and sets us to the tasks which He has to fulfil for our time. He commands. And to those who obey Him, whether they be wise or simple, He will reveal Himself in the toils, the conflicts, the suffering which they shall pass through in His fellowship, and, as ineffable mystery, they shall learn in their own experience who He is.'

Have a joyful – and a challenging – Easter.

## PARTNERSHIP UKRAINE MISSION UPDATE

Thank you as always for your ongoing support of Ukraine Christian Partnership (UCP). We and the people we support in Ukraine are most appreciative of your donations and prayers. Thank you, Connie's handicraft group, for your very kind donation of £130.

At time of writing, there are talks about a ceasefire, although sadly the war meanwhile continues. Please pray that peace will triumph over evil. Please could you also continue praying for Pastor Sergey and his church and community in Chornobaivka, Kherson. We have recently funded drone detectors for volunteers who are delivering food and medicines to elderly and housebound folk who live in the most dangerous parts of Kherson city, where Russian attacks on civilians and civilian areas are sadly a frequent occurrence (e.g. Inside the Ukrainian family homes destroyed by Russian bomb strike in Kherson - video Dailymotion; https://nationalpost.com/video/b58396f0-00ed-11f0-ae7d-8a3e7ef079e3/damage-in-the-centre-of-kherson-as-local-authorities-say-russia-attacked-the-city).

On a more positive note, we have just funded a seeds project for villagers in Transcarpathia. This was a very successful project the last two years and this year we are providing 350 families in Akli, Aklihegy, Gyula and Ujakli with about 20 different types of vegetable seeds. This will enable them to grow more of their own food. We pray that this year's harvest is as good as last year's. Last year, the village of Gyula was even able to donate over one ton of vegetables (grown from those seeds) to a local orphanage!

## Would your church like to join us this year?

<u>UNLOCK – Urban Christian Charity Walk – London (Kennington,</u> Camberwell, North Brixton, Stockwell and Battersea )Saturday 12th April

Unlock is a non-denominational Christian charity founded in 1972, supporting urban churches of any denomination to cope with the opportunities and challenges in their areas. They especially work to enable Bible engagement in more 'text-shy' cultures. As well as helping local Christians reach and engage with their communities, they provide training and publish a variety of Bible study packs.

### The London Urban Sponsored Walk

This year's walk is the 42nd annual London walk, all of which have been supported by St Mary Magdalen members. This year we are hoping once again to involve the rest of the PACT churches.

Each year the walk covers a different area of the capital, and includes brief visits to a variety of churches which put on small exhibitions of their local outreach work and provide refreshments for the walkers. The work of the churches in some of the more deprived areas can be a real eye-opener!

This year the circular walk is around Kennington, Camberwell, North Brixton, Stockwell and Battersea on **Saturday 12th April**. It is about 7½ miles but walkers are free to shorten this and/or partly use public transport. **It is suitable for all ages and abilities, and a great day out for families (but not unaccompanied children.).** There is a detailed route map and an optional quiz. Ideally we like to travel up together by train, and it is most fun to walk in small groups, as walkers are not "herded" round! Usually there are around 400 people walking, some clockwise, some anticlockwise, so there is a very friendly atmosphere on the streets when we meet fellow Unlock walkers!

#### **Sponsorship**

The main aim of the walk is to raise funds for the Christian mission work of the Unlock charity in inner cities. There are sponsorship forms for individual use among friends, neighbours and colleagues, and also opportunities at each church on the walk to donate cash to that church and/or to Unlock generally.

Church workers we have met on previous walks were immensely grateful just that we took the trouble to visit them and take an interest in their work. We have been inspired by their amazing responses to situations, so dramatically different from our own. Mission support is more than just financial!
