

Happy 1700th Birthday, Nicene Creed!

This month, 1700 years ago, one of the most important meetings in the history of the Christian Church began in the Bithynian city of Nicaea. It began in May 325 and went on until the end of July 325.

The Council of Nicaea was convened by the Roman Emperor Constantine, and he had an urgent job for the Christian bishops to do. He wanted them to spell out as exactly as they could the core beliefs of the Christian Church, especially with regard to the person of Christ.

Constantine had good reason to do this: a man called Arius of Alexandria was spreading the idea that Jesus Christ was not divine but instead was a created being. Such a belief, if accepted, would have changed the very heart of Christianity.

After three months of hard work, the bishops at Nicaea had prayerfully and carefully written down as exactly as they could the core beliefs of Christianity. It became known as the Nicene Creed, and it has been the bedrock of orthodox Christianity ever since.

The Nicene Creed is unique in that is the only Christian statement of faith that is accepted as authoritative by the Anglican, Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, and major Protestant Churches.

It runs:

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.


We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father. Through Him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation
He came down from heaven;
by the power of the Holy Spirit
He became incarnate of the Virgin Mary and was made man.
For our sake He was crucified under Pontius Pilate;
He suffered death and was buried.

On the third day He rose again in accordance with the scriptures; He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and His kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son He is worshipped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

Amen.

Holy Smoke! We need Fire Marshals

I'm delighted (and slightly relieved) to announce that I have successfully completed my fire marshal training! After bravely enduring over two hours of online learning—armed only with a cup of tea and a determined spirit—I have emerged as our first officially



trained fire marshal. I even passed the final test, proving that I know the difference between a fire extinguisher and a teapot! But I can't do this alone—we need a few more willing volunteers to join me in keeping our church safe.

Fire safety is a vital part of our church community, ensuring that everyone who worships, works, or visits our building is protected in the event of an emergency. Fire marshals play a crucial role in this, as they are trained to prevent fire hazards, assist with evacuations, and respond quickly in case of an emergency. Their knowledge and preparation can make all the difference in keeping our congregation safe. Having a dedicated team of fire marshals in place helps us meet safety regulations and provides reassurance that we are well-prepared should the need ever arise.

We are currently looking for around ten volunteers to step forward and become trained fire marshals for our church. The training is straightforward, delivered online, and takes just a couple of hours to complete, finishing with a short knowledge test. Upon successful completion, volunteers receive a Certificate of Achievement. This is a great opportunity to serve the church in a practical and essential way. If you feel called to help in this important role, please get in touch with myself or drop a note in to the church office. Your willingness to serve could make a real difference in ensuring the safety of our church family.

Gift Day Appeal

For those that have been attended regularly at recent Church Meetings what follows will come as little surprise, but the time has now arrived for everyone to face up to the realities of the Church's financial position.

The renovation of the sanctuary, to which we all committed with such enthusiasm, has, together with fitting-out, cost a little more than we had initially hoped, and whilst we as a Church fully accepted that it would drain a significant proportion of our then capital reserves (and indeed Synod funding dictated that we should use our own money first), we still remain some £30,000 short of what we needed, and which has been covered by a temporary Synod loan. That in itself would not be too bad if we had not also failed to balance our books last year on our regular income and expenditure (partly due to a reduction in lettings) leaving us also to fund a deficit of well over £10,000. On top of this, urgent repairs are now needed to the parapet wall of the Church Family Centre (CFC). We've received several estimates, ranging from £2,000 to £12,000. The variation reflects the possibility that once initial work begins, more extensive issues could be uncovered, which would require additional repairs.

Finance and General Purposes Committee have held the view that prudent financial policy dictates that we should also, long-term, seek to re-build our reserves to meet future unknown contingencies, an approach endorsed by the Elders, but that is for the future.

We all know that household budgets have come under greater pressure, particularly in the last few weeks, and no time is the right time to make a call on our congregation to make greater sacrifices, but you will realise that we need at least £50,000 as a matter of some urgency. The Elders have decided therefore that we must make this call to the congregation, and a Gift Day appeal will be launched on Sunday 18th May.

Throughout history, the church, both here in Petersfield and globally, has been able to continue in its mission to see God's Kingdom established here on Earth, because of the generosity of its membership. Luke 21:1-4 reminds us of the value of giving what we can.

'As Jesus looked up, he saw the rich putting their gifts into the temple treasury. He also saw a poor widow put in two very small copper coins. "Truly I tell you," He said, "this poor widow has put in more than all the others.

All these people gave their gifts out of their wealth; but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on."

What we are not asking you to do is to give more than you can afford and to risk putting yourself at harm because of this. However, 2 Corinthians 9:6-8 reminds us of the importance of generosity and how it should be at the heart of our faith – God has blessed our community with this amazing resource. Our building is able to serve so many people throughout the week, we see the very youngest coming in and hearing that they are loved, and we are able to support those in their later years who may be struggling for whatever reason, also showing God's love in very real and practical ways. I'm going to end with those words written by Paul to the Corinthians along with the petition to give what you are able on Sunday 18th May (or anytime really...) to see this vitally important work continue to thrive and flourish. Thank you.

'Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work.'





Barnabas – a very likeable disciple

This month we remember St Barnabas, whose real name was Joseph, a wealthy Levite from Cyprus. However, he was better known by his nickname which means 'Son of Encouragement' (Acts 4:36). Throughout Acts we see him encouraging others in different ways.

Barnabas was an example of *generous giving* (Acts 4:36-7), when he sold property and offered the money to the church for those in need. In the midst of a caring and sharing community, he was singled out as a symbol of generosity. Are we known as somebody who is generous to those in need around us?

Barnabas later *encouraged a new Christian* in the person of Paul (Acts 9:27). After Paul's conversion and knowing his reputation, Barnabas came alongside him and brought him into the fellowship of the church. Are we ready to help those who are new in the faith to find a place in our church?

Finally, Barnabas was sent to the church in Antioch where he 'saw the evidence of the grace of God' (Acts 11:23). It was a church which brought Jewish and Gentile believers together for the first time. Like Barnabas, do we rejoice when we see God doing new things in people's lives? Are we also willing to embrace these things and facilitate change?

Encouragement is one of the spiritual gifts in the New Testament (Romans 12:8). It can be greatly undervalued, but it is crucial in growing the church. Like Barnabas, will we nurture gifting; strengthen the doubters and those tempted to give up; show generosity to God's people and beyond the church; alongside strengthening people to move beyond their own comfort zones to help those in need?

Let's be prepared to ask the following questions: 'Are there people alongside us who will encourage us?' and 'How can we be encouragers to others?'







TKC is now held in nearly 90% of countries worldwide, across 85 different denominations and traditions. The aim everywhere is the same: that friends and family, neighbours and colleagues might come to faith in Jesus Christ.

"Specifically, we again invite each and every Christian across the globe to pray that God's Spirit might work in the lives of five people who have not responded with their 'Yes' to God's call."

Whether you have joined in 'Thy Kingdom Come' before now or not, you are warmly invited to take part & join in for this 10th anniversary of worldwide prayer.

And for this 10th year, the focus will be on the Lord's Prayer itself. As the TKC website explains:
