From the Minister ..

Friends, in this first edition of The Messenger of the year, let me take the opportunity to wish you all a very Happy New Year. I wonder what 2024 has in store for us.



Whatever is ahead, I hope and pray that we will find many opportunities to meet, laugh together, eat together and spend time getting to know one another that little bit more.

As part of ministry in the United Reformed Church, we are required every other month to have what is called 'Pastoral Supervision'. Basically, what this entails is reflecting on an element of what we do with someone who is a trained accompanier and think about what we might do differently or how we might try something new. Last time around, I was reflecting with my supervisor about how I was feeling this element of fellowship had been affected by Covid and that the ripples of this were still being felt today.

I realised that it has seldom been the case that we have invited people for dinner over the past couple of years, something we tried to do regularly before the pandemic. This isn't a unique phenomenon, my supervisor mentioned that so many churches across our country are struggling to pick up where we left off in this way of engagement, it is also true that many other organisations have suffered decline because people became used to not getting out and socialising in the way we once did.

We are told right at the very start of the Bible in Genesis 1 that mankind was not built to be on their own, so why is it that we've become so good at it? I for one, having reflected on this, can see how things have changed and I miss the opportunity to deepen relationships over a meal or a coffee. I often talk about church as being like a family, I firmly believe that regardless of age, gender or whatever else, we are united in our family bonds which are based on the foundation of our faith in Jesus Christ. In 2024, I hope that we can re-establish these bonds.

When we first arrived at the church, we trialled something I'd done previously in another church called dinner for six.

Whoever wanted to would sign up on a list and they'd be matched up with five others to have dinner together. Someone would host and do a main course, someone else would bring a desert, starter, drinks etc. In 2024, would you be keen to do something like this? How about coming and joining with us on a Thursday morning in the sanctuary for our short time of prayer together? We meet at 10am and spend time praying for our church, the world around us and anything else that might be on our hearts, we will be offering tea, coffee, and cake after this and yet another opportunity to come together in fellowship.

We have so many things in common, far more than the things that divide us, and I'd really like for us as a church family to work on how we relate to one another, really getting to know each other so that we can support and encourage our brothers and sisters in Christ.

If you have any ideas of anything else we might do to grow in this area, please do let me know.

I hope and pray that 2024 is a year for deepened relationships within this family and that this will be a blessing to us as we try to authentically live out our calling as disciples, reaching out into our community that needs, desperately, to feel the benefits of belonging.

Enduring the Storm

Proverbs 10:23-25NIV

²³ A fool finds pleasure in wicked schemes, but a person of understanding delights in wisdom.
²⁴ What the wicked dread will overtake them; what the righteous desire will be granted.
²⁵ When the storm has swept by, the wicked are gone, but the righteous stand firm forever.

We all go through trials in life. They may be health trials, relationship trials, financial trials, or emotional trials, but all our hardships and difficulties end up being spiritual trials as well.

Scripture never promises that we will be able to go through life without encountering storms and setbacks. There is no promise that life will be easy, or simple, or smooth sailing.

Nevertheless, God promises to be with us always. Through the storms of life, he will be our anchor. And the best way to test the strength of an anchor is to endure a storm.

Jesus taught that whoever follows his teaching is "like a wise man who built his house on the rock" (<u>Matthew 7:24-27</u>): when a heavy storm came, the house did not fall; it was built on a solid foundation.

With God as our foundation, we can stand firm, trusting that our destiny is safe in his hands.

Mighty God, guide and protect me through the storms of life. Help me to trust you in the midst of trials and lead me to live in right relationship with you. Amen.



Mission News

Thank you very much indeed for your ongoing kindness to Ukraine Christian Partnership. We are most grateful for all your donations and prayers. We would like to give a special thanks to Connie's handicraft group for further kind donations (£270) which meant the terrific total of £945 was raised during 2023.

Pastor Sergey and his church have continued their amazing service to the community despite such difficult times. At the end of November, an artillery and rocket attack killed 3 people (including a member of the congregation) in their village, Chornobaivka, and more than 60 homes were damaged. The church (with UCP support) made emergency repairs to over 10 of the worst damaged. If you would like to view a video of some of this work, use this link https://youtu.be/vhSGYwJwMU0 . The 'regular' house rebuilding work has also carried on despite the less-than-ideal conditions https://youtu.be/4BegSs28Jac . People are just so grateful for the help being given.

While we were happily celebrating Christmas, the same was not true for Pastor Sergey's village. As people were walking to church, rockets landed right across the road from the church. Pastor Sergey prayed with those who had come but had to send them home because of the danger. Service cancelled. The week between Christmas and New Year was particularly bad for shelling in the area, which is coming from across the other side of the Dnipro River.

At a 'normal' Sunday service, people turn their mobile phones off - not to avoid them ringing, but to stop the Russians locating any groups of people.

It does not matter whether you are at church or not, it sadly makes no difference to the Russians.

Please could you pray for Pastor Sergey and his congregation. Please pray they may be protected during this terrible time and that they would know God's comfort and strength. The peace that passes all understanding. Thank you.



What's so special about Jesus?

The gospels record that people were astounded by many of the things that Jesus said. Even His enemies, intent on trapping Him, admitted: "No one ever spoke the way this man does." (John 7:46) Furthermore, "the crowds were amazed at His teaching, because He taught as one who had authority, and not as their teachers of the law." (Matthew 7:28-9)

For in Jesus, we find something without precedent in the span of human literature. While urging humility on others and while giving the impression of the ultimately humble person, Jesus' teaching and claims are basically *egocentric and completely focussed on Himself*. In ordinary life, that would get a person labelled as crazy or as a megalomaniac!

Just think of the few astounding claims Jesus made about Himself. "I am the Resurrection and the Life." (Jn 11.25) "I am the Bread of Life." (Jn 6:35) "I am the Light of the World." (Jn 8:12) "I am the Good Shepherd." (Jn 10:7,9) "...whoever lives and believes in Me will never die." (Jn 11:26) And – most staggering of all - "anyone who has seen Me has seen the Father." (Jn 14:9)

CS Lewis comments on the inescapableness of Jesus' uniqueness: "There is no half-way house, and there is no parallel in other religions."

That Jesus cannot be ranked among a pantheon of religious leaders or prophets becomes further obvious when one reflects further on His claim of being at both the beginning and at the end of Creation and of History. He said: "I am the First and the Last" (Rev 1:17), as well as : "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me." (Mt 28:18).

Clearly the disciples accepted this, as John begins his gospel with these words: "In the beginning was the Word (Jesus) and the Word was with God and the Word was God... Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made....The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us.... and in Him all things hold together." (Col 1:16,17)

When we look at what Jesus goes on to say about the end of history, we are even more startled, as when He said of any person who follows Him: "I will raise him up at the last day." (Jn 6:40) Yes, between Creation and the end of History stands Jesus. That also means, of course, and we note it with comfort, because everything in between is His also.

During this Lent, why not spend some time just quietly thinking about these claims of Jesus?




