From the Minister ..

Spring has always been one of my favourite seasons, as the days start to draw out a little, there are suddenly little signs of new, fresh life all around us. It has been lovely over the



past few weeks to see a little more sunshine and it certainly helps me to feel more positive about the state of the world even if the media does its best to portray the opposite...

Christmas barely seems 5 minutes ago but we find ourselves gearing up for Lent and next month, Easter. I'm delighted this year to be running a lent course based on the film 'The Theory of Everything'. The film, if you've not seen it, is a biopic based on the life and achievements of Professor Stephen Hawking and the course gives us a great opportunity to explore a wide range of topics ranging from Science and Religion and whether the two can mix, to the themes of suffering later in Hawking's lifetime and how we can see this in the light of the suffering endured by Jesus on His journey to The Cross. There are more details in the form of a poster later in this edition of The Messenger but Keith, Esmé, Jo and I hope to welcome as many people as are able, to join us on a Thursday evening for 5 weeks starting on March 6th.

Of course, lent is typically a season for reflection and at times it can feel quite sombre. This is, I think, right and proper. We remember Jesus' time in the wilderness, and it gives us a great opportunity to take stock of what is important in our lives, perhaps, removing some of the unnecessary distractions which can cause us to lose focus on the simple things that perhaps, matter the most.

But we must not lose sight of what we know comes next... Just as spring is starting to show its first signs all around us, giving us hope for the brighter weather and better times ahead, we know that Jesus' time in the wilderness came to an end. In Jesus' death and resurrection, we find hope that this life is not all that there is. There are small shoots of God's Kingdom all around us, we see these early signs of what is to come next through the kindness of friend and stranger, through the person in Tesco buying extra to give to the foodbank, through the smile we give the person on the bus or in the street who may not have had any human contact for days. We are called to emulate Christ in our world and when we do that to the best of our abilities, we see those small shoots breaking through offering hope and joy to a world that needs to feel these things when otherwise, things may feel hopeless.

A Lent Reflection



Somebody asked a Christian friend why he was eating

doughnuts, when he had given them up for Lent! He answered, 'At the bakers I told God, that if He wanted me to buy doughnuts, He should provide a parking space in front. On the eighth time around, there it was!' Rather than seeing Lent simply as a time to give things up, let's use it intentionally for self-examination, reading Scripture, penitence, fasting and prayer.

At Jesus' baptism, God's voice says, 'You are My Son, whom I love; with You I am well pleased.' (Luke 3:22). The Holy Spirit then leads Jesus into the wilderness, where we find Him coming to terms with who He is. Satan's temptations challenge Jesus in key three areas of His identity: His divine sonship, political power and Messianic role (Luke 4: 1-13). It is as though Jesus was looking into the mirror at Himself to discern what kind of Saviour He should be.

For us, Lent is an opportunity to hold up a mirror to ourselves and ask the question, 'who am I? It's a season of honest encounter with who we are, what we've done, and how we should live. What will we see when we hold up the mirror to ourselves? Keeping Lent, the 40 days running up to Easter, could mean taking time to read Scripture, studying a Christian book or spending five minutes each day in silence! We might fast by missing one or two meals, refraining from TV, alcohol, social media, or scrolling on our phones. All of these can help us to give more attention to God in our lives.

Whatever we do, Lent is a season for self-reflection, as we put ourselves in a position to receive afresh the forgiveness and healing that God offers.







30th March - Mothering Sunday & Mother Church



The Fourth Sunday in Lent was called 'Mid-Lent' or 'Refreshment Sunday', when the rigors of Lent were relaxed more than was normal for a feast day. It is called Mothering Sunday as a reference to the Epistle reading for the Day (Galatians 4:21-31). The Lenten Epistles follow from each other with teaching about our life as Christians and how we are to follow Christ.

On Mid-Lent Sunday the Epistle talks of bondage and freedom; the bondage of the Law and the Old Covenant as compared to the freedom in Christ, "the promised one", and the New Covenant. Verse 26 reads "But Jerusalem which is above is free, which is the mother of us all." We gain our freedom from Christ and, as it was seen before the Reformation, the Church.

Thus, Mothering Sunday is about the freedom that we gain through the promise of Jesus Christ delivered through our Mother the Church. People were encouraged to go to their 'Mother Church' (their home church or their home Cathedral) to worship and give thanks. Hence apprentices, and others, went home for the weekend and often brought gifts (or accumulated pay) home to their family.

On the other hand, Mother's Day is a secular festival invented in 1904 and is celebrated on the 2nd Sunday in May in most countries in the world. The UK seems to be the exception. In recent years Mothering Sunday has been hijacked to take the place of a special, secular day to give thanks for our mothers.

Sharing a few Eco thoughts

This is the **pyramid** or **hierarchy of waste.** The greatest effect is brought about by actions at top of the pyramid, e.g. preventing use or production of a piece of plastic at all is better than using it and then recycling it or disposing of it. Much of this would apply to carbon dioxide production, e.g. the upper 3 apply to hydrocarbon fuel usage, which we may be able to prevent by walking, cycling or reduce by car sharing.



URC CFC - The built-in sink soap dispensers in the ladies lavatories are both working, so we no longer need to use a single use plastic soap dispenser. This is an example of prevention of single use of plastic and minimisation/reduction of rate of plastic usage.

BEYOND KERBSIDE RECYCLING, to help us in our attempts to be good stewards of God's beautiful creation!

See the adjacent <u>Petersfield infant school recycling poster</u>, but if it is more convenient to you, there is a crate in the CFC for these items which David Barton then kindly takes to the school

<u>Liss junior school</u>, if you live in Liss or are passing you might like to know that 9am -3pm during term time, Monday to Friday, reception will accept the items below.

You can also now leave these items in the bag for <u>Liss junior school</u> in the CFC, to be kindly taken to the school by Tony Phillips who lives near the school. **Liss JS**:- Digestive and other biscuit wrappers; cracker and cake wrappers; crisp packets; oral care products – toothpaste tubes and toothbrushes; Pringle tubes, **all clean and tied in a bag**.

Medicine blister packs are now accepted at Boots the Chemists High street Petersfield.

Boots the chemist also has a recycling scheme for empty beauty, health, wellness and dental products, from any brand, that can't be recycled at home, the link for which follows.

Plastic bag recycling available at some supermarkets including Waitrose and Tesco's Petersfield.

Soft plastic packaging can be returned to the **Causeway Tesco store**, the majority of which can then be recycled (80% in a trial), e.g. fruit and veg packaging, salad bags, crisp packets.

Tetrapak Cartons and paper containers (such as Pringles tubes etc.) can be recycled at the bank site at Tesco Petersfield, The Causeway, GU31 4JR

Cleaning, loo paper, and tissue products that pledge to reduce ocean microplastics as you buy, and /or plant trees to offset your carbon footprint. Check them for yourself:-

Beware of these contagious diseases in church

Frontophobia: A morbid fear of the front seats in church. The sufferer is struck by an attack just inside the church door, and so collapses in the nearest back seat.

Bearing fruit takes time

The nine fruits of the Spirit are Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self-Control. We don't strive for the fruits of the Spirit, rather we plant ourselves in good soil, allow ourselves to be fed by the Holy Spirit, keep taking in nourishment, turn to face the light of Christ and these fruits will develop and grow in our lives.

Can you tell whether a tree is an apple tree or a pear tree? Not easily when they are in blossom, but very easily when they bear fruit. Bearing fruit takes time and a lot of planting, preparation, nurture and growth.

March is the time of year when gardeners begin to plant seeds ready for summer, but patience is needed – the seeds will take a while to germinate, and the gardener needs to write the names of seeds on labels and not forget which are fruit, flowers and vegetables. The seeds need to be in the dark, or the light, or the warmth or the cool, depending at what stage of life they are at.

So too, is God with us. God writes our names on His heart; God knows what fruit we can bring forth. God nurtures us and gives us light to grow. But first, we need to be planted and that can be scary.

Maybe you are feeling in a cold dark place this March, maybe it feels as if you've been buried, maybe you've got a weight above you and you can't see the way out. Just think that maybe you've been buried because you've been planted.

With patience there will be warmth and light, be like a seed, trust God, and begin to grow out of the darkness towards God's marvellous light. We won't see fruit immediately; we have to be nourished and mature and ripen. Patience will be given to us, fruit of the seed of the Holy Spirit.
