

From the Minister ...

The former United States Ambassador to Germany, James B. Conant, once said this; 'Behold the turtle. He makes progress only when he sticks his neck out.' As you will all know, we are about to enter a substantial project renovating our church



sanctuary, this is inevitably going to bring about disruption to how smoothly things run for us as a church and when the works are complete, I recognise that a lot will have changed. Change can be difficult to come to terms with and whilst we do not want anybody being upset, we have to take that quote and run with it, sometimes decisions need to be taken and somebody has to stick their neck out in order for us to make progress. The Elders and I are extremely grateful to Tim Abbott and Wendy Cassar for being those people who will have decisions to make over the coming months and I would ask you all to be supporting them both in and through your prayers, recognising that some decisions that must be taken will not please everybody, but we move forward together with humility and grace recognising that this project is ultimately in God's hands and we strive to do God's will.

At church meeting last month, I spoke about how we would need to start having some conversations about how we might worship together during the months in which the sanctuary space is out of use to us. Unfortunately, whilst we have the use of the CFC, this only comfortably seats 50 people and recently our numbers have been considerably higher than this. Several options were considered including the usage of our site up at Liss for a more traditional contemplative service earlier in the day before holding a more family friendly service up at Petersfield, or simply running two services at Petersfield in the CFC. We recognise that some who might prefer a more traditional time of worship together may have issues getting up to Liss and so we want to ensure that if this is the path we take, it is going to be accessed by those who would like to be there. We had a fairly detailed conversation about this at elders and agreed that the best way forward would be for us to produce a questionnaire which will be sent to all members and adherents asking questions such as, which kind of service would you prefer, are you able to travel, are you able to offer transport to others etc.? Please get thinking about these things, we aim to have a questionnaire ready to go at the start of March.

Away from all of the building project stuff, I'm delighted to report that we are going to be having a church away day alongside the congregation from London Street URC, Basingstoke (my other ministry at this time). This will be taking place on Saturday 30th September up at Ditcham Park School. We have booked Jo Patterson who works as a church related community worker in Peckham — London and she will lead us in a couple of sessions thinking about how we can be the church in our community. We will also have time to worship together and a nice chunk of free time in the afternoon in which you can go for a walk, play some board games or sports, experience Forest church or do some creative writing. The grounds of the school are beautiful, and you certainly won't be bored! More information will come your way in the coming weeks, but if you are interested in coming along, please pop your name on the sign-up sheet in the CFC.

Brothers and Sisters, this year is going to be an unusual one, but I urge you to show grace to one another. Ephesians 4:2-6 reminds us of the importance of this, it says; Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.

Head for the wilderness

'And he said, 'Which way shall we go up?' And he answered, 'The way through the wilderness...' 2 Kings 3:8

The only way into the Promised Land is through the wilderness. One Bible scholar has called it 'God's killing field'. He says: 'That's where the things that cause us to stumble in our walk with God are permitted to die; where God 'weeds out' those who want only a momentary, superficial relationship with Him, from those who want their lives really to count."

If your life is a wilderness at present, take heart: God is there with you the whole time. It's where you learn to stand and to cast all your cares on Him (1 Peter 5:7). Sometimes God will lead you there abruptly, especially if He's been trying to get your attention. He may want to talk to you about the call He's placed on your life, but you haven't had time to listen. Now you find yourself in the wilderness, and you realise that God is the only one who can get you through this.

Here, He permits you to be stripped of pride, so that you can be clothed with humility; stripped of self-sufficiency, so that you can be brought to the place of total dependence on Him. If you're there today, don't think that God's punishing you or that He's forsaken you. No, He's simply allowing some things in your life to die, so that other things can be born and grow into life and fruitfulness.

You'll get through this and by God's grace you'll reach your destiny. The truth is — there is no other way to the Promised Land other than through the wilderness.



1st March: St David's Day, time for daffodils

1st March is St David's Day, and it's time for the Welsh to wear daffodils or leeks. Shakespeare called this custom 'an honourable tradition begun upon an honourable request' - but nobody knows the reason. Why should anyone have ever 'requested' that the Welsh wear leeks or daffodils to honour their patron saint? It's a mystery!

We do know that David - or Dafydd - of Pembrokeshire was a monk and bishop of the 6th century. In the 12th century he was made patron of Wales, and he has the honour of being the only Welsh saint to be canonised and culted in the Western Church. Tradition has it that he was austere with himself, and generous with others - living on water and vegetables (leeks, perhaps?!) and devoting himself to works of mercy. He was much loved.

In art, St David is usually depicted in Episcopal vestments, standing on a mound with a dove at his shoulder, in memory of his share at an important Synod for the Welsh Church, the Synod of Brevi.

Thank you once again for your continued generosity to Ukraine Christian Partnership. We are very grateful for all your prayers and donations; thank you to Connie's handicraft group for a further £100.

While our main focus is currently on helping those affected by the war, we are pleased to report that the long-planned (but delayed by Covid and start of war) deep well for Gyula has now been drilled. In the hot, dry summers the village runs short of water and this well will be a great boon. However, the drilling did have its moments. Pastor Zoltan (who folk may remember from his visit to us in 2015) went outside to inspect progress, just before a church service.

Unfortunately, this coincided with the drill hitting mud - the 'interesting' results and his more usual appearance are below!





All is thankfully peaceful in the villages, although long power cuts and other hardships mean that life is far from normal. Our friends in Kherson have that to endure together with Russian artillery and missile strikes. We thank the Lord that two rockets which landed in the grounds of Pastor Sergei's church did not explode.

Due to the war, Pastor Sergei's village church only has about 7 or 8 church members remaining, but they are doing sterling service, providing food and other essential supplies to needy villagers. This has only been possible thanks to all the kind donations we have received. While church members are few, church attendance is quite a different matter. There are now around 150-160 folk attending and the small building means two Sunday services are necessary. Praise the Lord. Light does shine out of darkness.

Let's make 19th March a Mothering Sunday



On 19th March most churches will celebrate their 'mothers'. £millions will be spent on Mother's Day gifts and cards, and children will give flowers to women in church. It's a joy to honour mothers for their love and caring, but our blessings are lessened when we forget the Day's original purpose.

The Mother's Day we know today began on 12th May 1907, in America, when a woman called Anna Jarvis held a service in her late mother's church to honour her work of organising women's groups to promote friendship and health. The idea spread, and in 1914 Mother's Day was declared an official celebration.

But the European Mothering Sunday goes back to the 16th century and was altogether more faith-based. On the fourth Sunday of Lent people went 'amothering', going to their 'mother' church, the main church in the region, for a special service. In those days domestic servants rarely had free days, but they were given a day off during Lent, so they could go along with their mothers and families. Times changed, and by the 1900s Mothering Sunday had largely changed into Mother's Day — a celebration of mothers more than mother churches.

Many Scriptures describe the mothering qualities of God, for example Isaiah 66:13 – 'As a mother comforts her child, so will I comfort you.' We also see it in women without children. I remember a spinster head teacher in a poor district in Wales mothering and bringing the best out of 'her' children. We see it in our housing and care homes, in older women who have never been mothers as well as those who have, as they comfort a carer who has had a miscarriage, or who needs encouragement. We see it in pastors, and in men who nurture others. Let's thank God for His gift of 'mothering', wherever we find it.

Eco corner - information and updates from the Eco Group

The 5 Rs of sustainable procurement, good practice, applicable to work, but also to home and church.

Reduce: can you do without or with less? For example, materials or energy? Many of us have put on extra layers through the cold snap to save on energy, is that something we can safely continue to continue saving energy usage? What other examples can you think of? Can we travel less or by train instead of aeroplane? Can we make that tank of fuel go further by adjusting our car driving style? Cycle or walk instead of drive?

Reuse: can you reuse or buy reused rather than buy new or single use? The Petersfield charity shops offer good opportunities for this (have you ever admired the beautiful variety of tea and coffee mugs we use at church which have been sourced by Val Hart? Many are from local charity shops), Petersfield freecycle/ free giving on Facebook.

Reprocessed, refurbished, repurposed, (mended)?

How good that we have a cobbler (Chapel Street) and can get bicycles and cars mended in Petersfield and clothes altered (Lavant and Chapel Street seamstresses). Do you try to mend things at home?

Renewable: what is the product made of, is it a renewable substance or energy, and what is the environmental impact of renewing it? Many biscuits, soaps and margarines contain palm oil that is not sustainably sourced, so it is worth reading the label. The Bran Tub (which has closed in recent weeks) stocked glycerine soap that did not contain palm oil, has anyone seen another shop supplying such soap? ***

Recyclable? See below.

Exchanging tips and getting local help and ideas from neighbours, family, colleagues, PeCAN, can be very helpful to help us apply these principles. We all benefit from some encouragement and learning from others.

Have you heard of Petersfield Climate Action Network (PeCAN)? They come up with new ideas and information on how to reduce our negative impact on the environment. For instance, having an energy efficiency survey of your home, costing the improvements suggested against the timeframe of benefit gained, or a thermal camera survey to see from where you are losing the most heat.

Tip from a neighbour – a Chimney Balloon (see picture). David has installed it, making the Darlings' living room less draughty.





Tip from PeCAN and a friend – thicken and lengthen kitchen and utility room curtains that needed replacing (26 years old, faded, had shrunk in the wash and needed washing again due to food preparation spatter). Put curtains in

places not previously considered, such as across our part glass back door (see picture).

These curtains will better insulate our kitchen and utility room.

Loft insulation – discovered that recommendations have increased in thickness in the last 26 years. Another idea for making our home more energy efficient. Have you checked yours?

Possibilities for more than kerbside recycling, for refilling and reusing in Petersfield....to be good stewards of God's beautiful creation!

See the adjacent Petersfield infant school recycling poster, but if it is more convenient to you, there is a crate in the church vestibule for these items which David Barton then kindly takes to the school (the poster is displayed over the crate too).

Liss junior school, if you live in Liss or are passing you might like to know that 9am -3pm during term time, Monday to Friday, reception will accept the items below. You can also now leave these items in the bag for Liss junior school in the church vestibule, to be kindly taken to the school by Tony Phillips who lives near the school.

Liss JS: - Digestive and other biscuit wrappers; cracker and cake wrappers; crisp packets; oral care products – toothpaste tubes and toothbrushes; Pringle tubes, all clean and tied in a bag.

Medicine blister packs accepted at Love Lane community centre for recycling, office open weekdays 0900 -12.30hrs, OR can be left in the same recycling crate in church vestibule adjacent to Petersfield Infant School items.

Plastic bag recycling available at some supermarkets including Waitrose and Tesco's Petersfield.

Soft plastic packaging can be returned to the Causeway Tesco store, the majority of which can then be recycled (80% in a trial), e.g. fruit and veg packaging, salad bags, crisp packets.

Tetrapak Cartons and paper containers (such as Pringles tubes etc.) can be recycled at the bank site at Tesco Petersfield, The Causeway, GU31 4JR Supermarkets, free of single use plastic.


