From the Minister ..

It is a unique month to be writing an article for the Messenger. As I write, we are not even in Holy Week yet, but by the time it is printed and distributed, it will be Easter Sunday! Often, we think of Easter Sunday as the end of the

journey, we've come through Lent, endured the suffering of Holy Week and Easter Sunday represents the conclusion of the drama.

However, Easter Sunday is just the beginning.

One of my favourite parts of Scripture is the account of the Emmaus Road encounter. Luke 24:13-17 says this;

Now that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem. They were talking with each other about everything that had happened. As they talked and discussed these things with each other, Jesus himself came up and walked along with them; but they were kept from recognizing him.

He asked them, "What are you discussing together as you walk along?"

I recently read a compelling article in the Church Times from back in 2010. It was written by Paula Gooder and she argued that perhaps the two met by Jesus on the road to Emmaus were in fact a married couple.

"One of the disciples is named Cleopas, an abbreviation of the longer name Cleopatros, and this may also be the Greek version of the Hebrew name Clopas. We know of a Clopas from John's Gospel, where one of the women standing near the cross is revealed to be Mary, wife of Clopas." —

We do not find out the name of the companion on the road but the fact that Luke tells us that they were passionately discussing together the events that had gone on, we could well imagine that these were people who had been first hand witnesses of all that happened.

In my household, we too interpret things that have occurred in different ways and this at times can lead us into 'spirited discussions'.

Whether you agree with Gooder or not, we can well imagine how the events of Good Friday would have caused disagreement and tension amongst those closest to Jesus.

He said this, and yet...

Jesus knew this. These two were so engaged in their discussion that anything could have happened around them and they would have been oblivious to it, I think.

The risen Christ stepped into the midst of their argument and transformed everything. This is what Christ can do for us as well. A few weeks ago, I spoke a little about the transformative action of forgiveness. It's not easy to 'forgive and forget' but Jesus here, models what it means to be a peacemaker. This kind of conflict resolution is so desperately needed in our world and as believers, we are called to mirror Christ in our actions and behaviour. We have a hope to share with this world, a hope for a better world where conflict is no more and we all live at peace, one with another.

So, let's see Easter Sunday as just the start of this, let's speak out against injustice, be bridge builders instead of fence builders and let's do what we can to love brothers and sisters, even those whom we disagree with because Christ came to show us a better way, a way of love, forgiveness and we can start to build this kind of environment in our communities today, it is in our small actions that the Kingdom of God starts to break through and transform our world.

Our May theme for the *Today* devotions, written by Jul Medenblik, is **"What is** the Church?"

When you think of the church, what comes to mind? Do you picture the large building with a steeple in your city or neighborhood, with a full parking lot on Sunday morning? Or do you think of a group of people who come together to encourage each other and to grow in their following of Christ Jesus?

When I say, "I'm going to church," I'm likely referring to the building where I worship on Sundays and perhaps also meet during the week. But that's just a building. More accurately, the church is an assembly of Christian believers, gathered in by the Holy Spirit, who are eager to live into God's Kingdom and to share their love of Jesus with those around them. Church should really be a verb rather than a noun. Rather than being a place to go, it's an action to do. It may sound strange, but we might better say, "I'm going churching!"

In our May *Today* readings, author Jul Medenblik will help us learn about the early church in the days following Jesus' resurrection and ascension into heaven. Mainly through the New Testament's book of Acts (short for "Acts of the Apostles"), we will first witness Jesus' ascension into heaven and then look at the events on Pentecost—the pouring out of the Holy Spirit into the hearts and lives of the apostles. We will see how, filled with the Holy Spirit, those apostles boldly and fearlessly proclaimed the good news to all those around them that

God's Christ was Jesus of Nazareth, and how that early church grew in great numbers.

We'll see how the church molded and shaped the early Christians. And we'll see how the church can and does do that for us today as well. I hope you belong to a congregation with whom you can learn and grow and share your faith with others. And my prayer is that this month's focus on the early church will help you to grow in your love for Jesus Christ and for his church today.

Reverend Jul Medenblik is a former attorney who became a minister and founded a church in New Lenox, Illinois, where he pastored for many years. He currently serves as president of my alma mater, Calvin Theological Seminary, in Grand Rapids, Michigan.



Called to be Fools!

April Fool's Day is the traditional way to begin this month. In medieval times the fool (or jester) was not just there for amusement. He had an influential role in the court because he could speak the truth in ways others couldn't. As Christians we are also called to be fools; Paul described himself as a 'fool for Christ' (1 Corinthians 4:10). In what ways is this an appropriate description of a Christian? In his letter Paul expands on this theme.

A foolish message:

'For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.' (1 Cor 1:18). The heart of the Gospel does not focus on clever ideas, but on the Cross of Jesus Christ. This message of foolishness and weakness is both God's wisdom and power for our lives.

A foolish community:

'But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong.' (1:27). The church in Corinth consisted of slaves, rather than the rich and successful. God calls the weak and vulnerable to follow Him, in order to shame those who think they don't need God.

A foolish ministry:

'My message and my preaching were not with wise and persuasive words, but with a demonstration of the Spirit's power, so that your faith might not rest on human wisdom, but on God's power.' (2:4,5). Paul's ministry didn't rest on human wisdom, but on the power of the Holy Spirit. For us, this power is often displayed when we are at our weakest.

<u>UNLOCK – Urban Christian Charity Walk – London (Kensington, Chelsea, Hammersmith & Fulham) Saturday 27th April</u>

Unlock is a non-denominational Christian charity founded in 1972. It supports urban churches of any denomination in responding to the opportunities and challenges in their areas. They are especially concerned with facilitating Bible engagement in more 'text-shy' cultures. As well as deploying Unlock Local Partnership workers to enable local Christians to reach and engage their communities, they provide training and publish a variety of group Bible study packs.

The London Urban Sponsored Walk

This year's walk is the 41st annual London walk, all of which have been supported by St Mary Magdalen members. This year we are hoping to involve the rest of the PACT churches.

Each year the walk covers a different area of the capital. The walk typically includes brief visits to a variety of churches who mostly put on small exhibitions of their local work and provide refreshments for the walkers. To us in the Petersfield area, the work of the churches in some of the more deprived areas can be an interesting eye-opener!

This year the circular walk is around Kensington, Chelsea, Hammersmith & Fulham, on **Saturday April 27th**. It is about 7½ miles but walkers are free to shorten this and/or partly use public transport. There is a detailed route map and an optional quiz. Ideally we would like to travel up together by train, and it is most fun to walk in small groups, as walkers are not "herded" round! Usually there are around 700 people walking, some clockwise, some anticlockwise, so there is quite a friendly atmosphere on the streets when we meet fellow Unlock walkers!

Sponsorship

There are sponsorship forms for individual use among friends, neighbours and colleagues, and there are also opportunities at each church on the walk to donate cash to that church and/or to Unlock generally.

Church workers we have met on previous walks were immensely grateful just that we took the trouble to visit them and take an interest in their work. We were inspired by their amazing responses to situations, so dramatically different from our own. Mission support is more than just financial!

Don't be afraid of clouds!

Have you ever sat and watched the clouds drift by? Some of them are vast, towering up and up into the sky.

There can be clouds of discouragement and suffering in our lives as well, circumstances that temporarily blot out the sunlight of God's love for us. You may have such a cloud hanging over your life right now. You may be in a hospital bed, or suffering discouragement, fear, despair or bereavement.

Have you ever noticed that sometimes, when you board a plane, the sky is like a thick grey ceiling? It looks impenetrable. But the plane does not hesitate - it climbs steadily onward and upward straight into the cloud. And what happens? Nothing! The cloud cannot block your progress, it must give way before you.

The simple truth is, you may not be able to *see* through clouds, but you *can go through them*. The plane uses navigational aids for guidance, and we have the Holy Spirit to guide us through the darkest times. And finally, we emerge through the cloudbank, and there before us is a sun-drenched sky of blue and golden glory, far above the dismal and disappointing things far below.

Whatever cloud is hanging over you at present, whether suffering, discouragement, fear, there IS something you can do about it NOW. Pray – pour out your heart to the Lord about it. He has promised that His grace will be sufficient for anything that we encounter in this life.

And – look up. Look towards heaven, *think beyond* those clouds, and remember His promise that the sufferings we may be undergoing *here* are nothing compared to the glory that God has prepared for us *there*.

The Bible assures us: 'The Lord God is a sun and shield: the Lord will give grace and glory: no good thing will He withhold from those who walk uprightly. O Lord Almighty, blessed is the man that trusts in you.' Psalm 84: 11-12

But Noah survived, because he – free from guilt Kept the Word of his God in his mind So he and his kin, in the ark he had built Lived with two beasts of every kind.


They floated by night and they floated by day
