

#### From the Minister ..

As you know, I'm very much into my football. Just a few weekends back I took Isla up to Kingsmeadow stadium after church to see the Chelsea ladies team beating their Spurs



counterparts by two goals to nil. I always very much enjoy watching Match of the Day (unless of course Chelsea have suffered a defeat) but much to my Hannah's annoyance, I often find myself falling asleep whilst it's on – I blame the late start on a Saturday night and two small children!

I did, however, stay up to watch the entire programme on a Saturday night a few weeks ago, but even if I'd only made it past the first game, I'd have seen nine goals scored by a very strong Liverpool side against Bournemouth who sadly, could not get into the game – they lasted just 3 minutes before conceding goal number one.

Sadly, as often happens in the modern game, this humiliating defeat led to their manager Scott Parker, being shown the door. It is a part of the game I dislike intensely, Parker was the hero just a few months ago having guided Bournemouth to promotion and after just three games and results not going their way, the ownership of the club has decided that a change is the only way they can move forwards. There is no other job in which so little loyalty is shown – it's ruthless.

There is plenty of speculation though that Parker largely lost his job because of comments he made speaking out against and criticising the ownership of the club. He said that his team were ill-equipped to compete at the level of the premier league and much of this comes down to other teams spending more money to bring in transfer targets than they were able to. The response back from the ownership was to stress that in order to keep progressing, it was

unconditional that the team and its management needed to be aligned in its strategy to run the club sustainably.

You can really see both sides of the coin, but it did leave me wondering about how and when we are able to speak out against something we see as an injustice. Those responsible in our eyes, might seem to have all the power which may leave us feeling unable to speak out because of a fear of repercussions.

The Bible has something to teach us about righteous anger. I believe that Jesus offers the ultimate example of what it means to be a leader. Throughout countless accounts, we see that he offered compassion when that was needed, he was decisive when he needed to be, and he took seriously the call on his life to serve all of those around him. Once, when he was asked about the most important commandment, he reminded those around him that this was to love your neighbour as yourself, putting their needs as highly on our agenda as our own. But one time in the temple, Jesus witnessed injustice as people were being cheated by money changers in this holy space. Not only did he speak out against this, but he also started flipping tables as a visible sign of this righteous anger. I feel for poor Scott Parker, whilst he might have chosen his words more wisely, he was speaking out against what he saw as an injustice.

Over the coming months, I have no doubts that unfortunately we are going to witness more and more injustice in our country. I believe it is my responsibility as a Christian leader, called to model my life on Christ, to speak out and challenge those in authority. I have and will continue to lobby our local MP to try to ensure that the voices of the marginalised in our community are heard and I will do so because I take seriously that important commandment from Jesus – love your neighbour as yourself. Let's look out for one another as life continues to be difficult for so many in the coming months and let us support

one another, however we can, by saying what needs to be said.

#### Learn to 'wait well' for things

'My future is in Your hands...'



# **Eco corner - information and updates from the Eco Group**

We offer a few tips on possibilities for more than kerbside recycling, for refilling and reusing in Petersfield....to be good stewards of God's beautiful creation!

**Medicine blister packs** accepted at Love Lane community centre for recycling, office open weekdays 0900 -12.30hrs, **OR** can be left in the same recycling crate in church vestibule adjacent to Petersfield Infant School items.

Plastic bag recycling available at some supermarkets including Waitrose and Tesco's Petersfield.

Soft plastic packaging can be returned to the Causeway Tesco store, the majority of which can then be recycled (80% in a trial), e.g. fruit and veg packaging, salad bags, crisp packets.

**Tetrapak Cartons** and paper containers (such as Pringles tubes etc.) can be recycled at the bank site at Tesco Petersfield, The Causeway, GU31 4JR

See the adjacent <u>Petersfield infant school recycling poster</u>, but if it is more convenient to you, there is a crate in the church vestibule for these items which David Barton then kindly takes to the school.

<u>Liss junior school</u>, if you live in Liss or are passing you might like to know that 9am -3pm during term time, Monday to Friday, reception will accept the items below. You can also now leave these items in the bag for <u>Liss junior school</u> in the church vestibule, to be kindly taken to the school by Tony Phillips who lives near the school.

Liss JS:- Digestive and other biscuit wrappers; cracker and cake wrappers; crisp packets; oral care products – toothpaste tubes and toothbrushes; Pringle tubes, all clean and tied in a bag.

Supermarkets, free of single use plastic.

**Refill and Replenish**, 15 the High Street, Petersfield, Tuesdays to Saturdays 9am – 5 pm

**Juniper**, 16 Lavant Street, Petersfield, Mondays to Saturdays, 9am - 5pm Sell food stuffs, handwash, floor cleaner, other cleaning products and other items.

- 1. Bring your clean containers (Tupperware, bags, jars etc)
- 2. Weigh your containers.
- 3. Fill your containers.
- 4. Reweigh your containers.
- 5. Pay.



















The New Testament has **four** *gospels*, **twenty one** *epistles* and the book of *Revelation*.


The **epistles** are a collection of **letters** that were written by the apostles to the early Christians, they contain teaching, instruction, advice and encouragement.



#### One Hundred Years of the BBC

One hundred years ago, on 18<sup>th</sup> October 1922, the BBC was officially founded as the British Broadcasting Company (now the British Broadcasting Corporation).

It was originally a private company, in which only British manufacturers were permitted to hold shares. But three years later it was liquidated and in 1927 replaced by a public corporation — the British Broadcasting Corporation — which had almost complete independence and, until the passing of the Television Act of 1954, a monopoly of the television service in Britain.

That year saw the birth of commercial television. The BBC's monopoly of radio ended when the Government permitted local commercial broadcasts, starting in the 1970s.

The BBC is not allowed to advertise or broadcast sponsored programmes. It should also not broadcast any opinion of its own on current affairs and matters of public policy, and be impartial on controversial issues. In recent years the BBC has been criticised for not keeping to these rules, but they were foremost in the mind of Lord Reith, the BBC's first Director General – a Scottish Presbyterian with strong Christian convictions whose influence lingered for many years.

The BBC has a public service broadcasting requirement to produce 115 hours of religious content on TV and 370 hours on radio each year. This of course leaves open the definition of religious content: atheists have complained that there is too much religion on the BBC, while Christians might point to the overtly secular assumptions made in the vast majority of its output.
