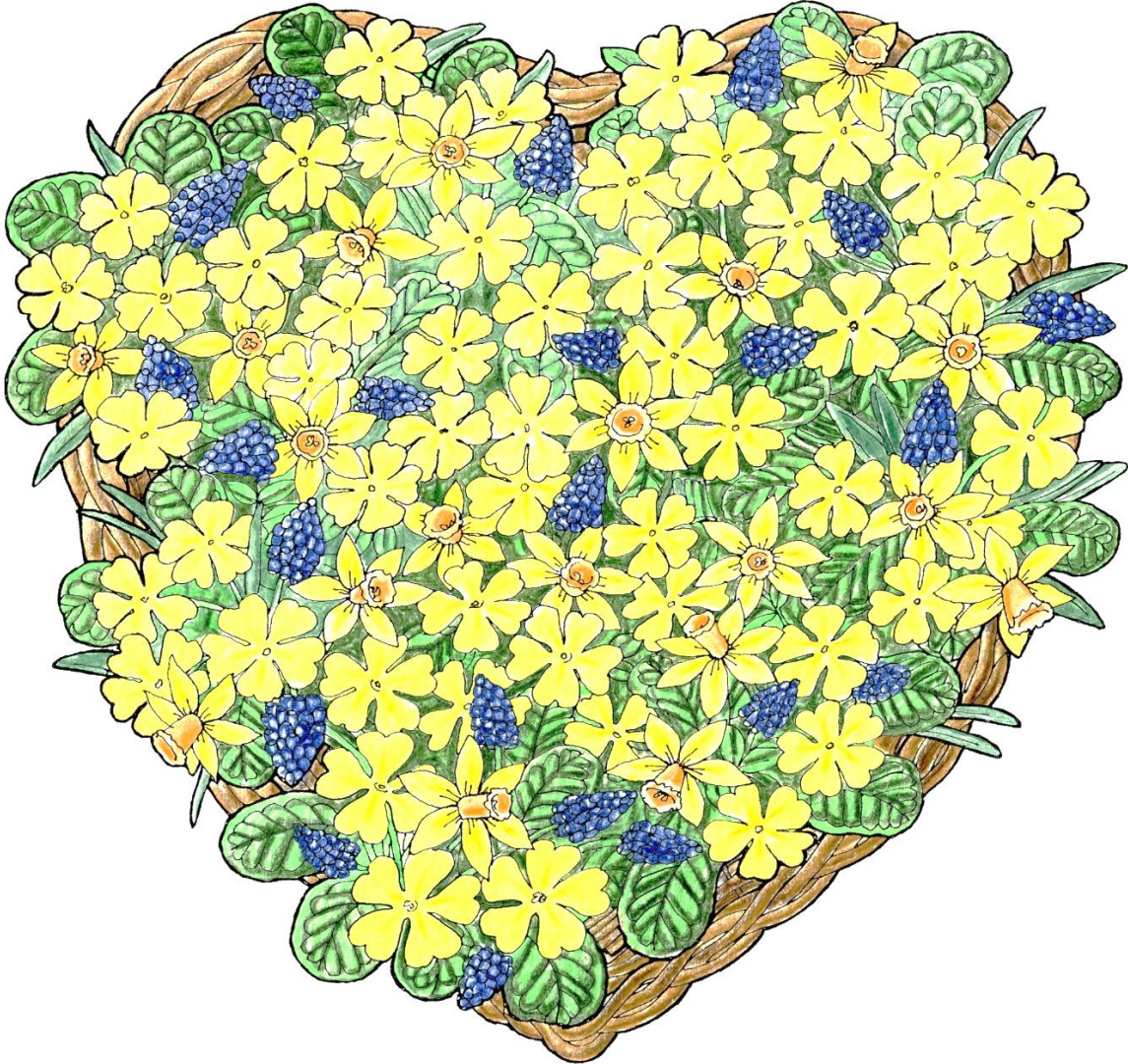

From the Minister ..

Lent: A Season for Slowing Down

Lent has a bit of a reputation problem. For some people, the word brings to mind gloomy faces, giving things up, and a long wait for Easter chocolate. For others, Lent feels like something meant for “really serious Christians,” not ordinary people juggling work, school, family, and everything else.



But Lent was never meant to be a spiritual endurance test. **At its heart, Lent is a gift.**

Lent is the forty-day season that leads us toward Easter. It echoes Jesus’ forty days in the wilderness and invites us to walk with Him—slowly and honestly—toward the cross and the empty tomb. It is a season for paying attention.

In a world that constantly tells us to hurry, Lent encourages us to slow down. To notice God. To notice ourselves. To notice where our lives are out of step with the love and grace we see in Jesus.

That’s where practices like fasting, prayer, and generosity come in. These aren’t meant to punish us or make life miserable. Instead, they help create space.

Giving something up can reveal how tightly we cling to comfort. Taking something up—like a daily prayer or reading Scripture—can help us listen more closely to God’s voice. And Lent is not about perfection. You don’t “fail Lent” if you forget, struggle, or have to start again. In fact, Lent assumes that we are people who need grace.

It reminds us that repentance is not about shame, but about turning back toward God, again and again.

There is also a quiet honesty to Lent. We remember that we are dust, and that life is fragile. But this honesty is never hopeless. Lent always points forward. Every confession leans toward forgiveness. Every act of letting go makes room for new life.

That's why Sundays during Lent still feel like Sundays. We still gather. We still sing. We still hear good news. Even in this reflective season, joy keeps breaking through—because resurrection is coming.

As Lent unfolds, it might help to ask a simple question: *What is God inviting me to notice?* It could be a habit that needs changing, a relationship that needs healing, or a grace that has been there all along.

Lent does not rush us to Easter. It walks with us there. Step by step. Honest, hopeful, and held by God's mercy.

And when Easter finally arrives, it is not just an ending—it is a beginning, shaped by the journey we have taken together.

My prayer is that you walk this Lenten journey with gentleness and kindness to yourselves and that you reflect on where God continues to lead you in your daily walk with him.

Mothers and Children

Whatever our childhood was like, it was formational. We learned from our earthly parents, good things ideally, although not everyone's childhood is great.

In the Bible, St Paul refers to the importance of up-bringing and of spiritual heritage. When he greets Timothy in his second letter to him, he calls him his 'Dear Son', praises his 'genuine faith' and then goes on:

"You share the faith that first filled your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice. And I know that same faith continues strong in you."

Timothy's childhood had been rooted in the Old Testament scriptures that he had been taught by his mother and grandmother. Their example had set him on the right path, until he was old enough to choose for himself to follow Jesus.

Physically, we when we are young, we need nurturing by mothers and fathers. Spiritually it is the same. When we come to faith, we need spiritual mothers and father to help us grow into maturity as God's adopted children.

We also need spiritual sustenance: regularly reading the Bible, spending time in God's presence in prayer, and worshipping with the family of the Church.

God – our heavenly parent provides our personal nurturing through prayer and the Bible, but He also gives us each other, to encourage and share our experiences of his faithfulness.

However imperfect our earthly upbringing was, *God is a good, good Father*, a perfect parent who will only teach us *good* things. And gradually, as the fruit of the Holy Spirit ripens in us, we will become more like Jesus. We will gain more of the family likeness!

Is there someone in your life who has helped you to grow spiritually? This Mothering Sunday, thank God for them.

Is there someone your life whom you have 'mothered' or 'fathered' along the way? This Mothering Sunday, pray for them.

The Way of the Cross

'Whoever wants to be My disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow Me.' (Luke 9: 23)



These words of Jesus are spoken at a turning point in the gospel. Jesus challenged the disciples about His identity and their commitment to Him: *'who do the crowds say I am?'* (Luke 9:18). It is at this point that He *'resolutely set out for Jerusalem'* (9:51). On our journey through Lent, as we look to the events of Good Friday and Easter, what are our priorities as Jesus' disciples?

To deny ourselves: this means to saying *No* to ourselves and *Yes* to God, as we humbly submit our will to His. Jesus prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane *'not My will but Yours be done.'* (Luke 22:42). It means putting Jesus first in everything: our work, family, ambitions, possessions, marriage, finance and future. We will not be guided by self-interest, but by allowing God to show us how to live in His way.

To take up our cross: this reminds us that the disciple is not immune from suffering, as we follow Jesus along the way of the cross. Just as He carried His cross to Golgotha, we cannot avoid experiencing suffering in a fallen world. Every day we are to live in way that demonstrates to everyone that we have died to ourselves, our selfish ways and ambitions, and seek to live for God. It means breaking old selfish habits and ways of thinking, as we allow God to renew us by His Spirit.

Perhaps that is something we should learn—to wait for Jesus our Master, to be always obedient to Him, to serve Him with all our hearts, and to bear the mark of His grace in our lives.

In all of this we cannot lose, because like Jesus, it is only through death that we find God's new life. *'He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep, to gain that which he cannot lose.'* (Jim Elliot).

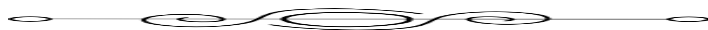

He gave his servants money to look after, depending on what they could do.

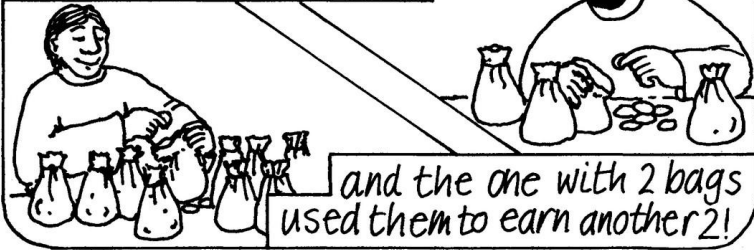


He gave 5 bags of coins to the first, 2 to the second, and 1 to the third.

The first two showed him they had doubled his money, and he was very happy with them.



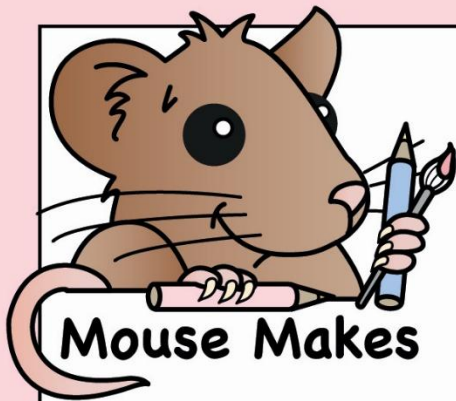

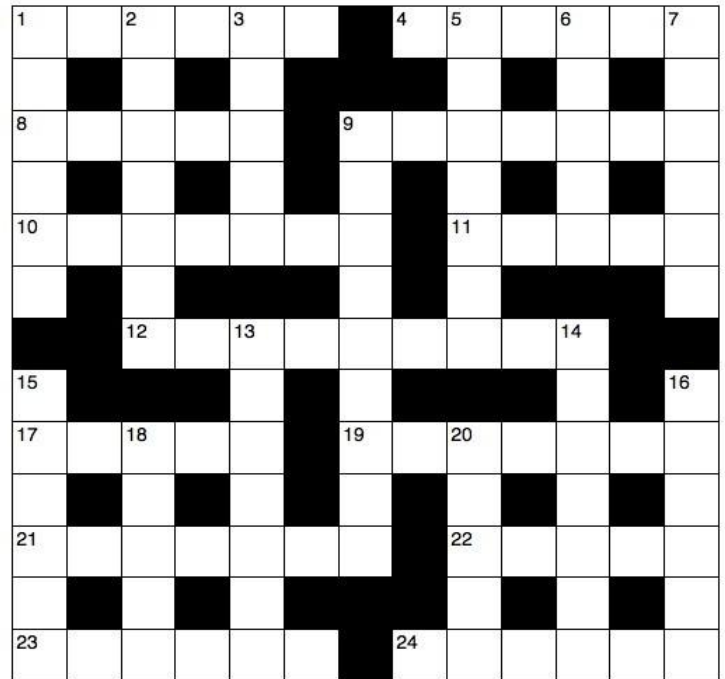

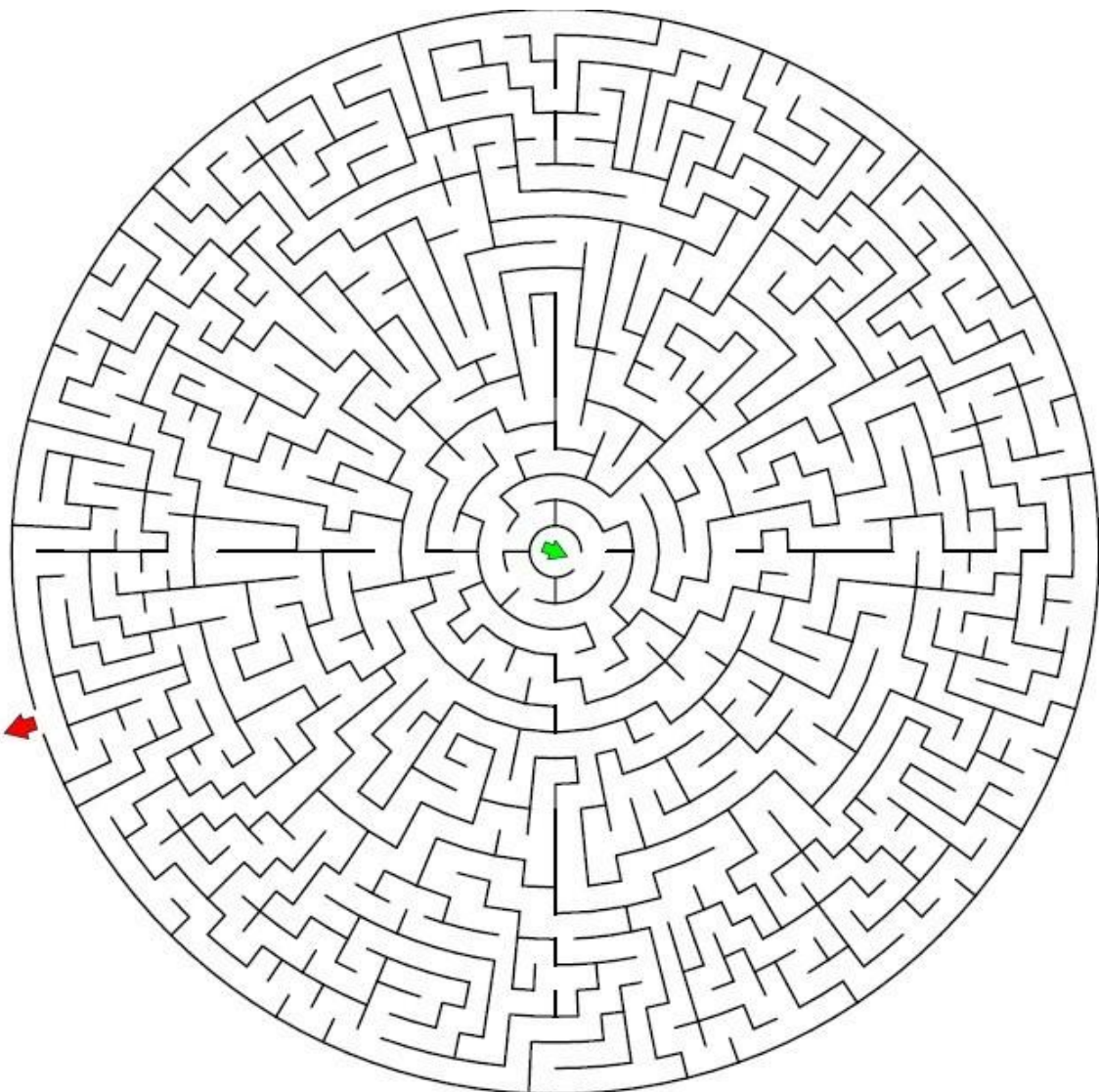

Greenbelt 2026

[Greenbelt Festival](#), a Christian festival centred around arts, belief and activism, has impacted hundreds of thousands of people over its 50+ years, including many URC folk. The URC's visible presence at Greenbelt since 2016 has been a tangible expression of the faith, joy and welcome of URC members who have volunteered in our Café and Youth teams or connected with us as festivalgoers, family and friends.

Has your church thought about going to Greenbelt as a church family. Some URC groups have found this really worthwhile and transformative in previous years, hiring a minibus or coach, administrating the group booking and offering bursaries or support so that everyone who wants to go is able to.

Groups qualify for discounted tickets (every 10th ticket at the full weekend rate is free): <https://www.greenbelt.org.uk/buy-tickets>. Greenbelt also operates a scheme that provides free tickets to nominated people who can't afford the ticket price on their own.

Greenbelt endeavours to be an [accessible festival](#). It is a Christian Festival, but also attracts seekers, questioners, agnostics and atheists who revel in the superb atmosphere and find space to connect and explore faith and justice.

Alternatively going as a URC volunteer is an option, entrance to the festival is free for volunteers, with plenty of free time between shifts to enjoy everything on offer. Our volunteers told us overwhelmingly last year that the experience helped renew their faith, gave them fresh ideas and energy, and helped them feel more connected with the URC at a whole. The closing date for applications for this team is 25 March. Apply using the link (which should appear very shortly!) on our webpage: urc.org.uk/greenbelt

The URC's presence at Greenbelt this year is generously funded by the Discipleship Development Fund, recognising the significant discipleship opportunities that the festival has on URC members.
